From The Director

"Asking the Right Question"

Voltaire, a seventeenth century French writer and philosopher, once said, "It is easier to judge the mind of a man by his questions rather than his answers." A true statement perhaps? In my many years of leadership, I have observed that good questions are generally heart-felt and often demonstrate a person's true thoughts and convictions. Answers generally do not.

Not too long ago I was in a church doing some leadership training for key ministry leaders. With good intention, we began to discuss the topic of church growth within America. Then it happened again. A very distinguished looking lady asked, "In light of the church growth trends that you have shared today, could you tell us how we can increase our church attendance?" I could not believe what I heard. I looked at the lady

and quickly said, "If you truly want to measure the success of your church in light of today's world, then you have asked the wrong question."

I see this all the time. People sitting in the church pew somehow measure the success or failure of their church by how many people are attending a given worship service. Wrong! To me there is but one scriptural gauge to measure the spiritual health of the evangelical church. It is embarrassingly simple. It comes down to one question



really and it flows from the words of Jesus Himself in Matthew 28:18-20. Are we making disciples? More than I want to acknowledge, I hear too many churches saying how their church has grown in attendance. Are we just entertaining Christians transferring from other churches who may be discontent? Are we spending time trying to convince Christians who walk through the front door how our church is uniquely designed to meet their needs? Do we value the quality of discipleship over the quantity of attendance? I guess I am sharing a little bit out of disappointment as I hear this subtle message over and over. The measure of how we are doing in impacting our community is not with filling seats in the worship center, but whether we are seeing lives transformed into Christ-like followers of Jesus.

I know there are many other important ways to measure health in a church. Just read the books, right? Simply if the gospel is being shared in all venues, people are being saved, new reproductive disciples are being added, then the church is healthy and growing regardless of problems. Seriously! If quality disciples are being added to our churches, then is that not the fulfillment of the Great Commission? I was sharing this concept in a church recently during some training time. Someone stood up to ask a question for all to hear, "Why haven't we been taught this in the church?" I broke out in tears. My heart ached. I told them it is very simple really. If disciples are being trained and transformed by the power of God's Word, then the church will grow spiritually. The Commission of Jesus in Matthew 28 will be fulfilled. I further said that if a church is not making these kind of transformed disciples, then it is declining, dying and failing. I asked, which will you choose to be?

We already know this, but the church in America is struggling. She is failing at the core command Jesus gave His followers and that is to make disciples. Did you know about 260,000 evangelical young people will walk away from Christianity each year? Most don't ever come back. Shockingly we are losing people from every generation in the church. The Christians that do remain in the church are not being reproductive in their living or transformed in their thinking for the future. We are not told to build a building, focus on programs or even offer the best worship service in town. We are told to make disciples who are being transformed by the power of His Word. We must step out in obedience and begin to prepare the next generation to follow Christ faithfully in this rapid changing culture.

After documenting the evangelical church for over twenty years, George Barna acknowledged something amazing in his book, "Revolution". He said, "One of the



greatest frustrations of my life has been the disconnection between what our research consistently shows about churched Christians and what the Bible calls us to be." I painfully understand this.

Let us partner together and remain obedient to the call to be a disciple-making church. A church that will reproduce meaningful relationships with God through Jesus Christ. The world is watching and waiting!

Joel moved to Lake Crystal from northern Saskatchewan in Canada, but was born in Mason City, IA. Interestingly, the home where he spent the first five years of his life was just a couple of miles from the spot where the music died in 1959. (Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens, and the Big Bopper all died in a plane crash that year.)

Joel and his wife Kristin have been married for 7 years and they have two children: Kaylin age 6 and Benjamin age 4. He says that the picture here is not real current, but a very nice picture in either case. One of Joel's favorite things to do is to read. So even after a long day, he's likely to enjoy reading in his leisure as well as spending time with his family.
